Birth

Daniel Asiedu Botsio, affectionately called Asiedu Botsio by family and Elder Botsio by church members and friends, was born on 17th March 1951, at Eguafo Breman, a village in the Komenda-Edina-Eguafo-Abirem Municipal District in the Central Region. He was a beloved son of Opaniynin Kwamena Botsio and Obaapanyin Ama Forwah, both of blessed memory. He was the first son and second of seven siblings. Both of his parents were farmers, so he started farming at a very tender age.

Education

He attended Eguafo Local Authority Primary and Middle School and completed in 1967 with Middle School Leaving Certificate (MSLC). Upon completion, he helped his father on his cocoa farm for some years before moving to Accra-Tema in search of greener pastures.

Family Life

Daniel Asiedu Botsio was a family-oriented person. In 1979, he met a beautiful young lady named Mary Aba Krakraba Baidoo of blessed memory, whose parents also hailed from Breman Eguafo, namely Opaniynin Kwesi Baidoo of blessed memory and Obaapanyin Ekuia Nenaamu. God blessed their union with five children. The couple lived together in Nungua, Accra, until 2008, when the Lord called Mary Baidoo to be with him. Later, he remarried Madam Joyce Amponsah, and their union was blessed with a child. They lived in Ashaiman until his demise. Daniel Asiedu Botsio is survived by six children and seven grandchildren.

Work and Career

After moving to Tema from Eguafo, life there was not all rosy, but through determination and perseverance, he secured employment with the Ghana Ports and Harbours Authority (G.P.H.A.) as clerk. Through hard work and dedication, he rose to the position of supervisor, a role he held with distinction for over 30 years until his retirement in 2011. He was affectionately known and called "Super" at the workplace.



Personality

~ ***(Acts 24:15)***


